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

1983 Social Security Amendments – What Happened and Why is 2034 Now the Breaking Point? By Gerry Hafer

Four decades ago, our Social Security system went through a period of brinkmanship when in the words of President Ronald Reagan, it faced "legitimate alarm that Social Security would soon run out of money." The National Commission on Social Security Reform (aka the Greenspan Commission) took up the challenge in 1982 and, after a year of deliberation provided a blueprint for shoring up the program and staving off insolvency for the long term, defined as a 75-year valuation period.

So why are we now hearing that Social Security financial life expectancy has been shortened by 25 years? In several recent public conference, Social Security's Chief Actuary Steve Goss noted that despite the Greenspan Commissions key future workforce assumptions - birth rates, mortality rates, etc. - being "extremely accurate," Social Security financial situation was worsened by an estimated 80 percent because of "unanticipated economic experience." He went on to describe the cause to be a phenomenon labeled 'income dispersion.'

To put this issue in everyday terms, 'income dispersion' here means that while the projections used in the 1983 calculations assumed 90 percent of the total workforce payroll would be subject to FICA tax – the 6.2 percent payroll tax paid by both employer and employee – studies have shown that this projection fell substantially short. Between 1983 and 2000, the percentage of earnings assessed payroll taxes fell from 90 percent to 82.5 percent. Looked at another way, this means that 7.5 percent of total workforce payroll dollars today - about \$12 trillion annually – would not produce revenue for Social Security.

Mr Goss characterizes 'dispersion' as the difference in where real wage growth occurred. He notes that real age growth for the roughly 6 percent of total earners was more than three times that realized by the bottom 94 percent. Further he suggests that the current proportion of total payroll subject to taxation is expected to remain relatively constant in the decades ahead, absent legislative changes.

As Social Security reform inevitably heats up, it is likely that the amount of US payroll subject to payroll tax will be an important factor in Congressional deliberations seeking a solution to the program's looming insolvency. It's one of the main ingredients that will be examined in hearings and testimony and as future Congressional bills are introduced.

THE SHARING CORNER...



Spring Getaway to Moapa Valley, Nevada A patchwork of horse farms, hay fields, and pomegranate trees, Moapa Valley is the rural backyard of <u>Las Vegas</u>. Valley of Fire State Park—about 50 miles northeast of the city—is the star attraction year-round, but spring's mild temperatures make it easy to explore newer and lesser-known spots.

Powerful forces of wind and water carved the giant sedimentary rocks at <u>Valley of Fire State</u>

<u>Park</u> into shapes as fantastic as an elephant's head. A half hour hike on the Fire Wave Trail leads to hypnotically undulating hills that evoke strawberries and vanilla ice cream in a parfait glass.

See the rare Moapa dace, a tiny, endangered minnow, at Moapa Valley National Wildlife Refuge*. A viewing area below the water level of a natural stream reveals the turbulent life of this bronze-colored fish. Along various trails, you can also spot Gambel's quail, vermilion flycatchers, roadrunners, and cottontail rabbits. *The refuge is only open to the public Labor Day to Memorial Day on Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays from sunrise to sunset.

Best Outdoor Sculptures in the Southwest: <u>Seven Magic Mountains</u>. Swiss artist Ugo Rondinone arranged <u>33 brightly painted boulders</u> (some weighing upwards of 28 tons) in seven vertiginous stacks in the desert about a half-hour's drive south of the Las Vegas Strip. According to the artist, it's "a creative critique of the simulacra of destinations like Las Vegas"—meaning you could compare the garish yet spare work to the bright neon towers not far to the north. **How to See It:** Directions are <u>available online</u>. There's a parking lot but no other facilities; be prepared for a raw desert environment. There are some interpretive signs, and you can also call (702) 381-5182 for a phone-based guide.

Four Seasons in Sisters, Oregon – This former lumber town, named for the Three Sisters peaks which serve as the town's stately backdrop is about 20 plus miles northwest of Bend. An 1880's style storefront theme was adopted by the City Council as part of its zoning ordinance in the early 1970's. Locally owned boutiques and sweet shops still line Cascade Ave and Sister Bakery continues to have a steady line out the door. Some destinations to consider: Five Pine Lodge and Spa, Hiking to the top of Black Butte, The Sisters Rodeo on the second weekend in June, Big Ponderoo is an outdoor celebration of bluegrass and Americana music, the Quilt show in July, Three Creek Lake Campground is always a great place to relax and Sno Cap Drive In on Highway 20 takes you back to the 1950's with their menu.

The Essential Beach Packing List by Chris Gray Faust

Headed on a beach vacation? Use this essential beach packing list to help you pack everything you will need for a relaxing beach getaway (see below for checklist). Best of all, it can save you money, since packing the right things now will keep you from having to repurchase items once you arrive.

Let other people sweat the small stuff and streamline our list of hot weather must-haves so you look cool, even when the temperature isn't. Here's what to pack for the beach – without overpacking:

Overall Plan: Light and breezy items should dominate your wardrobe choices. While you want to be comfortable, skip the faded and raggedy T-shirts and instead aim for a summery look that is casual but polished. And while you are packing, you may be tempted to focus just on getting there...make sure you also spend some time thinking about how you will transport wet and sandy items back home. There's nothing worse than a suitcase full of sand. **CGear** has a line of products including lounge chairs, blankets and bags that are 'sand free' and are must-have additions to your beach packing list.

What is essential? No beach vacation is complete without a swimsuit. Buy more than one so there is always something dry to wear and bring them along in your carry-on. For footwear, pack flip flops, sandals, water shoes or canvas tennis shoes, depending on the type of beach you are on.

Choose a mesh nylon beach bag with a distinctive pattern so its easy to spot in a crowd and make sure it has inside pockets, preferably waterproof, to store valuable and small electronics such as your cell phone. Speaking of gadgets, make sure that they are waterproof or have protective covers. A soft-sided insulated tote for drinks and snacks is easier to carry than a bulky cooler. Pack some disposable wipes for quick clean up. Reusable plastic bags can be your best friend; use them to bring food to the beach and then carry wet swimsuits and towels on the way home. And you will probably want a portable speaker too.

Secret Weapon - If you wear corrective lenses and your beach sessions involve exploring reefs for colorful fish, you may want to invest in a prescription snorkel mask. Having your own mask can also prevent communicable diseases.

Safety first - No matter how good it feels, the sun is not your friend. Load up on sun protection with a strong sunscreen that you can re-apply often. If you are traveling to your destination by plane, look into sunscreen towelettes that won't explode or leak like bottled sunscreen. When you are lathering up don't forget your face. Add SPF lip balm, and wear sunglasses and a sun hat. Make sure to check the environmental regulations at your beach destination as some places are banning harmful and coral damaging chemical sunscreens. Instead shop for reef-safe sunscreens.

Leave at home - Being on the beach is an excuse to cut loose; avoid bringing clothing that is too stuffy or structured. If you are staying at a hotel, find out ahead of time if towels and other beach

amenities are included. Many vacation rentals also have 'house' items such as camp chairs and barbecue grills so there is no need to bring your own.

15 Beach Bag Essentials you need for Summer:

Hyperon Body Wipes – After a long day at the beach you will have sand, salt and sweat on your body. Quickly refresh before heading back to your car – or the closest bar – with these wipes.

It will compliment your artfully tousled hair and protect your locks from damaging UV rays so your hair won't dry out. I recommend using it on damp hair and reapplying it after swimming.

Icy Cool TSA approved Neoprene Caddy – keep those beach bag essentials that you don't want to be exposed to the sun shaded and cool with these bags. Whether it's your phone, a snack, medications, or toiletry items, these pouches are a great alternative to a cooler. Simply freeze the inserts and place them in the lining of the bag.

Vitrix Kitchenware Bottle Caps – throw this bottle stopper in your beach bag so you can close and save your drink on the beach. Each bottle stopper comes in a different color, so you know whose bottle is whose. The stopper fits on bottles like beer, wine, water, juice or sports drinks and is a must have for serious beach days.

Takeya Actives Water Bottle – Stay hydrated. These babies will stay cold for 24 hours and come in sizes as large as 40 ounces. Whether it's water or something stronger that you want to keep discretely chilled, this bottle will be one less thing to pack in the cooler.

Dock and Bay towel microfiber towel – These towels are easy to transport and perfect for the beach. The extra-large size is great for more than one person to use and the lightweight material makes it easy to shake any excess sand off.

Blue Lizard sport sunscreen – obviously sunscreen and sun protection are beach bag essentials, but we especially love this for its environmentally friendly formula. The formula is also mineral based and paraben free. This dermatologist recommended sunscreen also packs up to 80 minutes of water resistance.

INSMY portable blue tooth speakers – this is perfect for the beach; it can float and has a long-lasting battery of up to twenty-four hours for days spent relaxing on the sand. Amazon reviewers love the sound quality, and the speaker doesn't take up too much room in your bag.

GoPro HERO11 Waterproof underwater camera – If you don't trust a waterproof case to fully protect your smartphone against the waves, this camera is the perfect solution. This powerhouse

camera can capture 5.3k video high resolution images and offers slo-mo playback. At almost \$500 this camera is certainly an investment. If you would rather leave the high-tech gear for photography enthusiasts, YISENCE has a waterproof digital camera that can capture your beach memories perfectly in up to 10 feet of water and at a price point below \$100.

Wallaroo Hat company crushable hats – for more beach bag essentials that will protect you from the sun, you will want a stylish hat for the beach. These crushable hats for men and women and kids have fabric with UPF 50+ protection.

REKS Unbreakable sunglasses – Sunglasses are a must-have item at the beach, and these are one of the ultimate beach bag essentials because they won't break or scratch and still have UV 400 protective lenses. Available in a variety of styles for both men and women just add on floating croakies and you will never lose or damage your sunglasses at the beach again.

Zesica Beach Cover up – A cover up is a classic but often one of the more neglected beach bag essentials. I love this light and airy dress because it's more like a blanket and you can adjust it to cover only the areas you don't want to be exposed to the sun.

World's Best Honey Garlic Pork Chops

A quick and simple grilled pork chop that everyone will love featuring a simple and easy glaze made with ketchup, honey, soy sauce, and garlic. Submitted by **John Chandler / Prep Time:** 10 mins **Cook Time:** 20 mins **Servings:** 6

Ingredients

- ½ cup ketchup
- 2 ⅔ tablespoons honey
- 2 tablespoons low-sodium soy sauce
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 6 (4 ounce) (1-inch thick) pork chops

Directions

- 1. Preheat grill for medium heat and lightly oil the grate. Gather ingredients.
- 2. Whisk ketchup, honey, soy sauce, and garlic together in a bowl to make a glaze.
- 3. Sear the pork chops on both sides on the preheated grill. Lightly brush glaze onto each side of the chops as they cook; grill until no longer pink in the center, about 7 to 9 minutes per side. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read 145 degrees F (63 degrees C).
- 4. Serve hot and enjoy!



Air Fryer Bell Pepper Poppers

When you want an appetizer, try these air fryer bell pepper poppers. Not everyone can take the heat of jalapeño peppers—no worries, though! Use brightly colored mini bell peppers, fill them with Boursin herb-flavored Gournay cheese, and add just a little piece of bacon to the top. Air fry in a single layer, cooking in batches, depending on the size of the air fryer. By Brenda Venable Prep Time: 15 mins Cook Time: 10 mins Total Time: 25 mins Servings:

Ingredients

- 9 mini pepper mini bell peppers
- 1 (5.2-ounce) package Gournay cheese (such as Boursin® Garlic & Fine Herbs Cheese)
- 6 slices bacon, each cut into 3 short pieces
- fresh parsley for garnish (optional)

Directions

- 1. Preheat the air fryer to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C), according to manufacturer's directions.
- 2. Slice each mini-pepper in half, from stem to tip. Remove membranes and seeds. Fill each mini-pepper with Boursin and place a piece of bacon on top.
- 3. Place filled mini-pepper halves in a single layer in the air fryer and cook until bacon is as crisp as you like, 8 to 12 minutes. Air fry in batches, if necessary.
- 4. Place on a serving platter, garnish with parsley, and serve warm.



Fruit Pizza

A delicious fruit pizza with a cookie dough crust, cream cheese filling, and fruit topping. A great tip for a quick crust is to use a package of ready-made sugar cookie dough rolled out to fit a pizza pan. Use an assortment of fresh fruit such as bananas, peaches, blueberries, kiwi, pineapple, and strawberries. Ingredients

- 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon cream of tartar
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- ½ cup butter, softened
- 1 1/4 cups white sugar, divided
- 1 large egg
- 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- ½ cup fresh blueberries, or more to taste
- ½ cup sliced fresh strawberries, or more to taste
- ½ cup sliced banana, or more to taste

Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- 2. Make the cookie crust: Combine flour, cream of tartar, baking soda, and salt in a medium bowl and set aside. Cream together butter and 3/4 cup sugar until smooth in a large bowl. Add in egg and beat well. Stir dry ingredients into the creamed mixture until just blended.
- 3. Press dough into an ungreased pizza pan.
- 4. Bake in the preheated oven until lightly browned, 8 to 10 minutes. Cool.
- 5. Prepare the filling: Beat cream cheese with remaining 1/2 cup sugar and vanilla in a large bowl until light and fluffy. Spread evenly over the top of the cooled crust.
- 6. Arrange blueberries, strawberries, and banana on top of the filling, and chill.





Update on the new postage rates, regulations and all things postal

Through snow, rain, heat and gloom of night, the <u>U.S. Postal Service</u> has delivered mail to Americans for nearly 250 years. Although that core task remains the same, that doesn't mean everything else stays the same in 2024.

From the <u>price of stamps</u> to procedures for forwarding mail, here are five things that will be different at USPS this year.

1. Stamp prices are going up

Like other businesses, the post office is passing along its increased costs to its customers. Effective Jan. 21, a first-class Forever stamp increased 2 cents to 68 cents. Across the board, prices increased about 2 percent. It plans to raise prices again on July 14, with first-class Forever stamps increasing 5 cents to 73 cents. A first-class stamp covers the cost to mail a 1-ounce letter; the cost of an additional ounce will rise from 24 cents to 28 cents.

2. ID is required for forwarding mail

Aiming to clamp down on identity theft and protect customers' information, USPS is beefing up its procedures to verify your identity when you request a change of address. Now you must either show ID in person at your local post office or verify your identity online. A change of address request, or COA, has to be submitted 90 days before the date of your move or up to 30 days after your move.

If you are doing it in person ...

Bring one of the following to your local post office:

State issued driver's license or nondriver's license identification card (name and address must match the old or new address on your request)

Uniformed Services Identification Card (requires a secondary form of identification) U.S. passport (requires a secondary form of identification)

Secondary forms of identification include:

Lease, mortgage or deed of trust

Voter or vehicle registration card

Home or vehicle insurance policy or card

The name and address on any secondary ID must match the old or new address on your change of address request.

If you are doing it online ...

An email address is required for online COA submission.

A onetime passcode or verification link will be texted to your cellphone.

A \$1.10 credit card identity verification fee will be charged to your credit card.

The billing address on the credit card must match either the old or the new address used in the COA request. Prepaid cards and gift cards are not accepted.

If the online verification fails, you'll have to visit the post office.
